 In the Hindu law book (The Laws of Manu) there are contradictory views on women



View #1

 Women must be honoured, and adored by their fathers, husbands and brothers, and brothersin-law who desire welfare.

 Where women are honoured, there the Gods are pleased, but where they are not honoured,

no sacred rite yields reward

View #2

 By a girl, young woman, or even by an aged one, nothing must be done independently, even in her own house.

 In childhood a female must be subject to her father, in youth to her husband, when her lord is dead, to her sons. A woman must never be independent

Women still carry the bulk of the household duties


 Government, educational and religious institutions are providing better opportunities for women to develop literacy skills and participate in work force
